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## Miles: Stadium Park District Won't Happen **In Next Legislative Session**

Proponents of a Stadium Park Management District ran into a buzz saw of public disapproval last week and found themselves out on a limb as the buzz saw cut them

A meeting room at Linkwood Park was packed Thursday night with residents - and some business owners-from throughout the Braeswood SuperNeighborhood area, a vociferous group who let their elected officials know they were not ready for another layer of government.

And while elected officials assured them that residential property would not be "assessed" or "taxed" to pay for the proposed district, attendees were unconvinced that their wallets would not be tapped in the future. Many also said that plans for the district has been formulated without their knowledge, and if a letter had not been sent out (required by law) telling

them that a bill establishing the district would be introduced in the 2013 Texas legislative session, they would have been blindsided by the whole effort.

The district was conceived by Houston City Councilman Larry Green as an effort to revitalize the South Main corridor near Reliant Stadium. He says he's watched other management districts doing good work to increase security, clean up the streets, erase graffiti and more, and he believes a management district in the area surrounding Reliant Stadium would provide the impetus for business investment in the area and economic development.

"We have pawn shops and motels," Green says. "I think we can do better."

The proposed district would include an area of 6.6 square miles centered on Buffalo Speedway and Interstate 610 South, and situated between the Greater Southeast, the Five Corners and the Brays Oaks Management Districts.

On paper, the gerrymandered boundaries resemble

Southside heard from their drainage expert last week, Mike Vandewater with KV Engineering, who informed them that due to some reorganization at the Harris County Flood Control District discussion has slowed on the Poor Farm Ditch drainage project.

Southside Place representatives continue to work towards their preferred plans and getting HCFCD to move ahead with it to improve the drainage situation for Southside. One of the hurdles is acquiring mitigation for improvements.

an aardvark about to take a bite out of Westbury. That's because, Green says, Fred Meyer, owner of Meyer Park and a board member of the Brays Oaks Management District, wanted his South Post Oak property included. That meant connecting the Reliant Stadium area to Meyer Park via a "neck" along South Braeswood.

Green held a series of meetings with constituents shortly after taking office in January, and he told them he wanted to do something to stimulate redevelopment in the South Main area. While residents apparently "heard" his desire, it was not clear to many that he wanted to establish a management district. In the intervening months, Green says he met with various commercial property owners and professionals who would do the paperwork to legally establish such an entity. Those efforts culminated in a letter

sent out last week from David Hawes, whose firm HawesHillCalderon has done the legwork to create management districts in Montrose, Spring Branch, Brays Oaks and other areas.

Hawes said the letter was sent to every residential and commercial property owner within the proposed boundaries of the Stadium Park District. Phone lines started to buzz and emails whizzed through cyberspace once the letter landed in mailboxes.

The verbiage which set off the fireworks included this provision: "The District will have the power to levy ad valorem taxes and to impose and levy assessments on property within its boundaries, to impose and collect other revenues for its public purposes, and to issue bonds and other obligations that are secured by such ad valorem taxes if such bonds are approved by the voters of the District at elections called for that purpose after receipt of required petitions."

Hawes, Green and State Rep. Borris Miles were the main speakers at Thursday's meeting, which was officially a meeting of the Braes SuperNeighborhood. Both Hawes and Green offered their mea culpas to the clearly unhappy crowd. However Miles, who residents say they were told would sponsor the legislation (along with State Sen. Rodney Ellis), said he knew nothing of the project until the day before. Ellis was not at the meeting.

Miles was not pleased that his name had been invoked as supporting the project. "I just found out about this yesterday," he said. "A neighbor brought it to me." Neither Hawes nor Green disputed Miles' statement that Miles had not been informed.

Green said residential areas were included in the boundaries to give homeowners an option to

increase security. He also named several large medical entities, such as the Women's Hospital, who had been left out of the boundaries at their request. He said the Texans. football organization was interested in the concept, but the property they occupy is owned by the county and so exempt from the assessment.

Order was difficult to maintain in the meeting, with multiple comments loudly delivered simultaneously. Attendees told elected officials "no" in no uncertain terms: "To me it appears dishonest," one woman said; "This idea did not come from the residents," said another: "I want my house out of the district," from yet another. Many spoke of their distrust concerning future taxation on their homes; a small business property owner included in another management district complained of frustration about its leadership: many said they simply didn't "trust" what was going on.

It was Miles who ultimately brought the meeting to a close by declaring he would not sponsor a bill in January establishing the district. "I am making the executive decision that this will go on the table," he told the crowd. "It will not come up this session."

He left the door open for further exploration of the idea, saying that if he was convinced that residents wanted the management district, it could come up in the legislative session two years away.
